
THE WORD

Year B . Season Colour: Purple . Psalter week 1



Jesus has just been baptised. The voice from heaven has proclaimed: You are my beloved son; in you I am well pleased. But how does Jesus understand this? What does it mean to be the Son of God?

Mark tells us that Jesus was put to the test, but does not give us any details about how this might have happened. It is worth noting that this event was no accident: it is the Spirit who is responsible for this experience and who drives Jesus out to face it. It is God who is putting Jesus to the test.

In a way, this is also the experience of the disciples of Jesus. They have already taken his message to heart: they have changed their attitudes (repented) and accepted the Good News. They have publicly declared this inner change by being baptised, and through this ritual have been adopted as God's beloved children. But this will not spare them being tested or undergoing trials, any more than it did Jesus. Mark often links the Gospel with the person of Jesus: Jesus embodies the message. His experience of the power of God in suffering and rejection through to the resurrection is the way presented to the disciple, then and now. The desert or wilderness may well be the place where the person is tested and fails, as in the story of Israel on the journey from Egypt to the Promised Land, but it also the place where the damaged relationship can be restored: it represents also a time of special closeness and intimacy between the Lord and the people of Israel.

DO

Choose something to do for Lent which will help to remind you daily of God's love for you: How you can better return that love in your personal relationship with the Lord?

SAY

The time has come: the kingdom of heaven is at hand.

REFLECT

he Gospels do not simply tell the story of Jesus: they mirror also the experience of the community from which they emerge An important theme in the First Gospel, the gospel of Mark, is that of discipleship, what it means to be a follower of Jesus. In our reading today, which sets the scene for our liturgical season of Lent, we are told that baptism may be the end of the initial period of conversion, but it is also the beginning of a lifetime commitment, and that the newly baptised person should expect to be put to the test in one way or another. In the Gospel tradition, Jesus has to face up to what it means to be the Son of God, and the struggle will be repeated at Gethsemane when the final test, the Passion, is about to begin.

At the beginning of Lent, we are invited to take up some practice of penance. For many of us, this is the firing-gun for a marathon ordeal, at the end of which we will feel pleased with ourselves for keeping our resolutions or a failure for not having done so. But that is not the point. The purpose of fasting is to heighten our spiritual awareness: the less the body has to do, the more the mind or spirit can function. This can be a rather uncomfortable experience: we are brought face to face with ourselves and what we are really like. But the purpose of Lent is to bring us closer to God, so that we may become more his beloved children. Then Easter will truly be a time of rebirth, a real cause for celebration.

LEARN

The term the temptations of Jesus is better understood as Jesus being tested.

The mention of wilderness and forty is meant to remind us of Israel in the desert: Israel was put to the test and failed.

Wild beasts are associated in the bible with evil powers.

Angels also minister to Elijah in the wilderness at Mount Horeb (Sinai).

A note from Fr Dermot: On Sunday last, Bishop Brendan Kelly was installed as Bishop of Galway during Mass in Galway Cathedral. His appointment means that our diocese of Achonry now has no bishop until a new bishop is appointed by the Pope. In the meantime, the day-to-day running of the diocese falls to the Diocesan Administrator. On Monday morning last, I was elected to and accepted that role. I will continue to serve as parish priest here in Swinford and will take on the added responsibilities of the Diocesan Administrator. I am only too aware of my limitations and inadequacies, so I earnestly ask you to pray for me at this time. With God's help and the prayers and support of the people and priests of the diocese, I will do my best to carry out my duties in the parish and the diocese. As Diocesan Administrator I will have to be absent from the parish from time to time – for example, to attend meetings of the Irish Bishops' Conference in Maynooth. During those times I will need to call on priests from neighbouring parishes to look after some of my duties here in Swinford. This will include funerals. Balancing responsibilities as parish priest and diocesan administrator will be challenging and I ask your patience, understanding and co-operation but above all your prayers as I try to do so. Thank you. The Divine Mercy Chaplet will be recited after 10 a.m. Mass each morning during Lent. Why not make this prayer part of your Lenten practice this year? Prayer cards with the Chaplet are available in all the churches this weekend. Please take one for praying the Chaplet after Mass or in your own home. **Trócaire boxes** are available in all the churches this weekend. Lent encourages us to be grateful for all that God has given us and to be mindful of people in need. Contributing to
