
# unday Messa SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

# THE WORD

#### Year B • Season Colour: Purple • Psalter week 2



# The incident which we usually call the Transfiguration of Jesus occurs at the pivotal point in Mark's gospel.

It recalls Jesus' baptism, and just as the baptism stands at the beginning of Jesus' ministry in Galilee, so the transfiguration occupies the same place in relation to his ministry in Judea and Jerusalem. On both occasions, he is identified as the Son of God. Mark actually says that Jesus was transformed. The apostle Paul quotes a hymn which says that Christ Jesus though he was in the form of God, emptied himself ... being born in the likeness of human beings. The point of the story is that the three privileged disciples are given a glimpse of Jesus' divine form. However, this experience is linked with the cross, a connection made by the use of the title Son of Man which occurs in passages to do with Jesus' passion and death, and by the mention of rising from the dead, the meaning of which escapes the disciples at this point.

Peter's reaction is to want to prolong the experience by constructing three temporary huts or shelters of the type used by agricultural workers at harvest time. These would be for Jesus and Moses and Elijah, who represent the tradition of Israel in the Law and the Prophets. The cloud which covers them is a symbol of the presence of God. Since harvest depended on rainfall at particular times in the Holy Land, clouds were positive signs of life and hope. The command Listen to him gives approval to Jesus as the representative of God: it also lends authority to his difficult teaching about discipleship which he will give during the journey. The disciples (and we ourselves) are urged to listen and obey.

## REFLECT

esus has already told the disciples that anyone who would be his disciple must take up their cross and be prepared to lose their very being. their innermost self. Peter, James and John are given a glimpse of Jesus' divine self, a manifestation of who Jesus really is. That is the true goal of the journey. beyond Calvary. Somehow the cross and resurrection - the event we understand as the Paschal Mystery - are crucial to the coming of God's kingdom in its fullness. The call to listen to him points to the proper response to Jesus and his place in the paschal mystery.

In the narrative, the disciples are about to set out accompanying Jesus in his

journey to Jerusalem and the events of Holy Week. Their experience on the mountain gives them an idea of Jesus' true identity and that the resurrection will take place. It is clear that they do not understand either of these notions fully, their reaction to each has been one of practically paralyzing awe at the first and puzzlement at the second. We are setting out on a similar journey through Lent, and the liturgy provides us with a similar glimpse, much less dramatic, in which it puts before us the message of Jesus' true identity as the Son of God and the central place of the cross, not just in God's plan as it is presented, but in our own lives as well. The purpose of Lent is to bring us closer to God and to Jesus. The instruction, Listen to him is addressed to us: we would do well to heed it.

#### LEARN

Mark tells us that Jesus was transformed, a rather stronger term than transfigured.

The incident reveals Jesus' divine form to the disciples.

Mountains in the bible are usually places of encounter with the divine.

Moses is the figure who represents the Law given on Mount Sinai: Elijah stands for the prophets of Israel. Together they symbolize the religious tradition of Israel.
