5TH SUNDAY OF LENT

THE WORD

Year B • Season Colour: Violet • Psalter Week 1

When he is told that "some Greeks", who have come to Jerusalem for the festival of Passover, want to see him, Jesus tells his disciples that "the hour" for him to be glorified has arrived. The period of his revealing his glory, which began with the first sign at Cana and ended with the final one of the raising of Lazarus, is over, and his passion is about to begin.

One of the features of the Fourth Gospel (John) is that some of the most dramatic scenes which we encounter in the three Synoptic Gospels are missing: these include the Testing of Jesus in the Wilderness (the temptations) and that of the Agony in the Garden (better expressed as the Struggle in Gethsemane). However, we find the components of these episodes scattered in the Johannine account. The scenes mentioned respectively present Jesus struggling with what it means to be the Son of God and to be faithful to his mission. They show Jesus in a very human light: in our Gospel reading today, Jesus realises that his hour, the complex events of his Passion and exaltation on the Cross has arrived and the possibility of praying to be spared it comes to his mind. However, he overcomes this understandable reaction and accepts the Father's will, since this is the purpose of his coming. The voice from heaven then vindicates Jesus' choice. There is a tendency sometimes to play down the human aspect of Jesus, to eliminate any hesitation or struggle on his part: although the Fourth Gospel views the crucifixion as the lifting up of Jesus in glory, this passage reminds us of the enduring dark nature of the cross. ■

REFLECT

It is difficult to keep in balance the two natures of Jesus, the divine and human aspects of his being. The Gospel traditions about his being tested and his final test before the Passion, described by the Synoptics in the Gethsemane scene and hinted at in our gospel reading today from John, suggest that we should not forget or play down Jesus' human nature. The Gospel of John shows Jesus as being well aware of his divine nature and relationship with the Father, but the temptation to take short-cuts to fulfil his destiny as the Messiah or to avoid the supreme test of the Passion altogether is still there, albeit in a much more subtle, but no less real, form.

If it is true, as the letter to the Hebrews tells us, that Jesus "has been put to the test in exactly the same way as ourselves, apart from sin", then we should not be afraid to imagine Jesus as being moved in much the same way as we would be in his shoes: for example, the Fourth Gospel tells us that Jesus is "troubled" when confronted with death. If Jesus is to be our model, then we need to know that he understands our human condition from his own experience and can sympathise with us in our difficulties and fears. ■

DO

Take the crucifix in your hands: reflect on the figure on the cross and on the human nature of Jesus.



LEARN

The Gospel of John does not contain some dramatic scenes which we find in the Synoptic Gospels:

These include the Temptations of Jesus, the Agony in the Garden, and the Trial before the Sanhedrin.

The Agony in the Garden is more accurately understood as the Struggle in Gethsemane of Jesus to remain faithful to the ultimate act of obedience to his mission from the Father.

Canon Michael Joyce: On Monday afternoon last, March 15th, the sad news spread of the death of Canon Michael Joyce in Mayo University Hospital in Castlebar. He was 81 years of age since 12th December last. A native of Foxford, he had strong associations with Swinford Parish over the years. Ordained in Maynooth College in June 1965, he was on the teaching staff of Coláiste Pádraig from 1967 to 1969, he served as parish priest of Kilconduff and Meelick from 1998 to 2009 and he lived in retirement here since 2014. Appointed to the staff of St Nathy's College, Ballaghaderreen in 1966, he taught there until 1991. He served as parish priest in Curry from 1991 to 1998 and in Bohola from 2009 to 2014. Wherever he served, in school or parish, Canon Michael developed a strong rapport with people and gave generously of his time, his talents and his energy. A priest with a deep faith and trust in God, that faith shone through when he prayed with people and especially when he celebrated Mass. Many will have fond memories of meeting him at family events or social gatherings or sharing a casual conversation in the shops or on the street. His kind and caring presence will be greatly missed in our parish community. Please remember Canon Michael in your prayers and may he rest now in the peace of Christ.

Palm Sunday: Next Sunday, March 28th, is Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week, the most important week in the Church's yearly calendar as we recall the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus. Once again this year because of current restrictions we will not be able to gather in our churches for the ceremonies of Holy Week and Easter. They will be live-streamed from Swinford Church and all are encouraged to take time and tune in as we pray through these holy days.
