


THE WORD

Year B • Season Colour: Red • Psalter Week 2



The Gospel of Mark has been described as "a Passion Narrative with a long introduction". The cross casts its shadow over this account of Jesus' life and ministry.

At the beginning of the story, we hear of the violent treatment and unjust execution of John the Baptist and the growing hostility towards Jesus, which reaches its climax in the plot of the religious and political leaders to do away with him. Jesus predicts his death three times, but the disciples do not understand. Discipleship is presented as taking up the cross and following Jesus, later illustrated by Simon of Cyrene.

It is a feature of Mark's Gospel that no one understands who Jesus really is. Jesus does not accept Peter's confession that he is the Christ, as this is, presumably, founded on Jesus performing miracles. This is corrected at once by the first prediction of the Passion. One of Jesus' inner circle arranges to hand him over to the hostile religious authorities. Jesus accepts his fate as the fulfilment of the Scriptures after his struggle in Gethsemane, during which he receives no answer from God.

A distinctive feature of Mark's account is the mention of the young man who "follows at a distance" and runs off naked when Jesus is arrested and all his disciples abandon him. This would-be disciple does not give up everything to follow Jesus, but rather leaves everything behind in order to escape.

Mark's depiction of the crucifixion is unremittingly bleak: there is no hint of sympathy from any quarter. Even those crucified with him taunt him along with the passers-by. Jesus is abandoned by everyone – including, it seems, by God. His cry from the cross is one of despair. But at the moment of his death comes God's answer, the tearing of the Temple veil which separated the divine presence from the people. Now Jesus will be the focus of God's presence for Jew and Gentile. It is at this point, when there can be no further misunderstanding, that the Gentile centurion accurately proclaims Jesus as "the Son of God". It is the cross, not the miracles, which reveals Jesus' true identity.

SAY

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? (Mark 15:34/Psalm 22:1)

LEARN

Mark's presentation of the Passion of Jesus is very bleak, suggesting that Jesus is totally abandoned and has to suffer alone.

The cross dominates the Gospel according to Mark.

Each evangelist has his own understanding of who Jesus is: we should read each account according to the appropriate point of view.

REFLECT

e must read each gospel version according to the viewpoint of the individual evangelist. We may find the idea of Jesus apparently despairing on the cross uncomfortable, but that is precisely the reason why we should think about it more deeply. If we believe that Jesus was truly human, we should read Mark's account without importing elements from the other evangelists which soften the picture. Mark tells us that Jesus experienced being totally abandoned, which may well help some of us who feel that way; that, in Jesus, God has experienced this feeling and so can understand our situation.

We notice that Mark mentions the women from Galilee who witness the crucifixion and includes by name Mary Magdalene as they observe where Jesus is buried. This prepares the way for the events of Easter morning. The cross and Calvary are not the end of Jesus' story.

DO

Take your palm in your hand. Reflect on the change in the attitude of the crowd from Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and their calling for his death a few days later. Do you see a similar manipulation of people today?

Holy Week: This Sunday we begin Holy Week, the most important week in the Church's yearly calendar, when we recall the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus, all that is at the core of our Christian faith. Due to continuing restrictions to curb the spread of the Covid-19 virus, we will not be able to gather in church for the liturgies of Holy Week but we can join together in prayer through participating in the ceremonies on-line via the webcam in Swinford Church. Holy Week reaches its high point in the Easter Triduum which begins with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening and leads us into the Solemn Commemoration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday afternoon and the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night when we celebrate the Lord's resurrection, a celebration that continues with the Mass of Easter Sunday morning. These are very special days for us as Christians and all are encouraged to take time to pray and reflect on the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection and its meaning for us now.

Palm Sunday remembers Jesus' entry into the city of Jerusalem to undergo his passion and death when he was joyfully greeted by the crowds. Palms will be blessed at the beginning of the 12 noon Mass on Sunday and will be available afterwards in all three churches for those who might like to bring blessed palm to their homes.

Holy Thursday: On Holy Thursday, Morning Prayer of the Church will be broadcast by webcam from Swinford Church at 10 a.m. Following an ancient tradition in the Church no Mass is celebrated on Holy Thursday except the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper when we remember Jesus' institution of the Eucharist. The Mass of the Lord's Supper will be broadcast by webcam from Swinford Church at 7.30 p.m. on Holy Thursday evening.

Good Friday: Morning Prayer of the Church for Good Friday will be broadcast from Swinford Church at 10 a.m. Following tradition, Mass is not celebrated on Good Friday. Instead there will be the Solemn Commemoration of the Lord's Passion on-line from Swinford Church at

3.00 p.m. This ceremony has its focus readings from scripture, prayers and the veneration of the cross. Those participating from home might like to have a crucifix or the cross on their rosary beads to hand to venerate for themselves during the ceremony. The Stations of the Cross will be broadcast on-line from Swinford Church at 7.00 p.m. on Good Friday evening, an opportunity to walk prayerfully, as it were, with Jesus on his journey to Calvary. Holy Saturday: Again, by ancient tradition, no Mass is celebrated on Holy Saturday. Morning Prayer of the Church will be broadcast on the webcam from Swinford Church at 10 a.m. Holy Saturday is a day when the Church keeps vigil at the tomb of Jesus, awaiting his resurrection. The Easter Vigil, the most important celebration in the entire Church year, draws us into the mystery of Christ's resurrection and will be celebrated on-line at 9.00 p.m. on Holy Saturday night. During the Vigil, as we mark with joy the Lord's resurrection, we renew our Baptismal promises and bless holy water. In all our churches, bottles of Easter Holy water will be available to bring home on Easter Sunday. **Praying at home in Holy Week:** To help mark this important week, resources are available for praying at home on our diocesan website, www.achonrydiocese.org/holyweek2021. **Penance Service:** On Wednesday of Holy Week, each of the six parishes in our cluster will hold a Penance Service on-line at 7.30 p.m. This is an opportunity to reflect on our lives, acknowledge our sins and in our hearts to ask God's merciful forgiveness until we can make an individual confession.
