Sunday Message



Once again, Mark presents the disciples as rather obtuse individuals who still do not understand what Jesus is all about, despite his speaking to them about the passion and cross.

They imagine, even now, that they can bask in reflected glory by being associated with him. For the third time, Jesus predicts his suffering and then he asks them whether they can share in the passion which is his destiny. When they reply that they can, he tells them that even that will not guarantee for them the places of honour which they desire. That is not in his gift; the Father has already decided who will occupy those places. Who they will be, we are not told.

This discussion leads into Jesus instructing the Twelve about the nature of true leadership. In the political and social circumstances of the time, in which the local population was under the thumb of foreign occupiers with the might of the Roman Empire behind them, the experience of officials abusing their power would be probably all too familiar. In Jesus' mind, true authority is revealed in service. State power is not to be the model for authority amongst the disciples. True greatness lies in being at the disposal of others, and for this the best example is Jesus himself. The idea of Jesus being the Son of Man who gives his life "as a ransom for many" is the key to understanding not only this passage but the entire Gospel of Mark. ■

REFLECT

THE WORD

Today we are asked to reflect on and pray for the missionary work of the church. We have heard a lot about Jesus' disciples in the Gospel readings of the past few Sundays, and have seen that to be a disciple of Jesus means first of all to have a personal relationship with him. Then Jesus sends his disciples out to share in his ministry of preaching and healing. It is this context of mission being part of what it means to be a disciple that we might think about on Mission Sunday.

Ireland has a proud tradition of missionary outreach back to the time of Columba.

The impulse to take the Good News to those who have yet to hear it has been part of Celtic spirituality from the earliest times. The religious orders of women and men and those who have gone abroad to minister as diocesan priests have contributed to the building up of the church throughout the world.

Today we have a different situation. The number of women and men offering themselves for that kind of life and apostolate has declined sharply and people now speak of the countries of Northern Europe, including Ireland, as the mission territory of today. However, a reverse flow of clergy and religious from abroad is not necessarily the answer. Perhaps we should see the decline in the traditional idea of vocation as a sign from the Spirit: the Holy Spirit may be asking us, the disciples of Jesus today, to find new forms of community life and worship rather than just to prop up the old familiar structures. This will need wisdom and courage; but the alternative is the death of the church. We might pray today for a new understanding of mission and the part we all have to play in making it a reality.

Are you in a position of authority over anyone (including your children)? How do you relate to those under you? Do you think of yourself as being in the position of a servant (this does not mean being a doormat) and that your responsibility is the well-being of those in your charge? Then look at the crucifix.

LEARN

Jesus' death on the cross has been understood from the very beginning as a sacrificial death on behalf of others.

The term 'for many' can reflect a Hebrew expression meaning that 'many' people make up 'all' people.

In English, 'many' means 'not all' (it is an exclusive term); in Hebrew, 'many' can have the meaning 'all' (it can be an inclusive term).

Christ's sacrifice can therefore be understood as redemption for all people. This does not necessarily mean that all are saved.
